Re: In the Matter of Google, Inc., File No. 1023136, Docket No. C-4336

Thank you for your comment on the Federal Trade Commission's consent agreement in the above-entitled proceeding. The Commission has placed your comment on the public record pursuant to rule 4.9(b)(6)(ii) of the Commission's Rules of Practice, 16 C.F.R. § 4.9(b)(6)(ii), and has given it serious consideration.

The Commission appreciates your support of the consent agreement. You also requested that the Commission require Google Inc. ("Google") to adopt certain measures in connection with the comprehensive privacy program mandated by Part III of the order. The Commission is committed to protecting consumer privacy and believes that the proposed order requires Google to build and maintain strong privacy protections for all of its products and services. As you noted, the consent order mandates that Google establish and maintain a comprehensive privacy program that addresses privacy risks related to new and existing products and services and that protects the privacy and confidentiality of "covered information," among other provisions.

While the proposed order sets forth several elements that the privacy program must include, some flexibility is afforded with regard to its implementation. This approach allows innovation in the area of privacy-enhancing technologies and is designed to keep pace with a dynamic marketplace. In particular, the privacy program must contain controls and procedures appropriate to Google's size and complexity that reflect the sensitivity of data handled, the scope and nature of Google's business activities, and the types of risks the company faces. To the extent that reasonably foreseeable, material risks arise from the products, services, and business practices discussed in your comment, Google must use reasonable and appropriate procedures to address these risks or it could face substantial civil penalties.

¹ "Covered Information" is defined in the order as "information respondent [Google] collects from or about an individual, including, but not limited to, an individual's: (a) first and last name; (b) home or other physical address, including street name and city or town; (c) email address or other online contact information, such as a user identifier or screen name; (d) persistent identifier, such as IP address; (e) telephone number, including home telephone number and mobile telephone number; (f) list of contacts; (g) physical location; or any other information from or about an individual consumer that is combined with (a) through (g) above."

In light of these considerations, the Commission has determined that the public interest would best be served by issuing the Decision and Order in final form without any modifications. It helps the Commission's analysis to hear from a variety of sources in its work, and it thanks you again for your comment.
